Teri Talk - September 2023

"God's work. Our hands." Sunday, introduced in 2013 to celebrate the 25th anniversary of the ELCA's formation, is an extension of **the work you do every day** to make your community a better place.

This day is an opportunity to celebrate who we are as the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America – one church, freed in Christ to serve and love our neighbor. Service activities offer an

opportunity for us to explore one of our most basic convictions as Lutherans: that all of life in Jesus Christ – every act of service, in every daily calling, in every corner of life – flows freely from a living, daring confidence in God's grace.

Many churches plan a specific "God's Work. Our Hands" ministry project on a designated day. The Mission of the Church is God's Mission – not ours. We are continually being invited to participate in God's work by serving and helping others in the world we live in. Martin Luther wrote: *"God does not need your good works, but your neighbor does."*

During the Russell County Free Fair, John Dumler and I offered a prayer booth in the commercial building. We heard several stories from families who spoke about how grateful they were for the Back-to-School Giveaway provided by St. John Lutheran Church, and how they were helped when they were going through hard times.

St. John Lutheran Church has many ministries through which we serve our neighbors near and far:

Gifts of Nourishment:

- Non-perishable food and personal care items are collected for the **Russell County Food Pantry** throughout the year.
- The **Heart2Home** project, created in response to the COVID pandemic, strives to keep St. John connected with its members and the community. Simple meals and shelf-stable snacks are provided to several individuals each Monday, providing both nutritional and spiritual support. In addition, the Monday project recipients receive the monthly newsletter, the quarterly devotional books, gifts created by Sunday School and Confirmation students, and seasonal notes and cards. Heart2Home volunteers keep a close eye on their "Monday People" and have helped with cable remotes, phone number look ups, package and mail delivery into homes and more. Heart2Home also shares treats with care center residents and "community heroes" (EMTs, County Health Department staff, dispatch staff, etc.) several times throughout the year. If you or someone you know would benefit from Heart2Home projects, please contact the church office for more information.
- In March and December, St. John volunteers deliver Meals on Wheels. These volunteers deliver meals (and smiles!) through rain, and snow, and sleet, and hail... and wind, and wind, and wind. To volunteer for Meals on Wheels deliveries, please contact the church office.

- Meals for New Babies volunteers prepare and deliver meals to families who have a newborn. These meals allow families a small break as they adjust to a new baby in their life. If you or someone you know is expecting (or has a newborn at home), please keep St. John updated! If you would like to volunteer to prepare and deliver meals, please contact Susan Krug at 785-324-2445.

Gifts of Comfort and Support:

- The **Prayer Shawl Ministry** meets weekly to create gifts of warmth and comfort, knitting and crocheting gifts of warmth and comfort in many forms from handheld prayer squares to lap blankets. All Prayer Shawl creations are blessed and made available to St. John members to present to anyone as reminders of God's love. To learn more about the Prayer Shawl Ministry, or to request a prayer shawl for someone, please contact the church office.
- The **Sewing Circle Ministry** creates quilts, the majority of which are donated to Lutheran World Relief who distributes them worldwide to war torn areas, refugee centers, areas of extreme poverty or homelessness, and to those who have experienced natural disasters, many of whom have lost their homes. The quilts are donated locally in response to community disasters, sent to Kansas shelters, and given as gifts to St. John graduates. Quilts are available to St. John members for a minimum donation of \$50.00 - these quilts make wonderful gifts year round. Everyone is invited to participate in the Sewing Circle Ministry - no specific skills required! For more information, contact Kaye Schlessman.
- The **Back-to-School Giveaway** helps students put their best foot forward every day with a wardrobe of school-ready clothing, a warm coat and shoes that fit; new personal care items, socks, and undergarments; and new school supplies. Items remaining after the Giveaway are passed on to a variety of organizations: Orphan Grain Train, Salina Men's Shelter, USD 407, Russell County Health Department, Russell County Food Pantry, Operation Christmas Child, Arc of Central Plains, Jana's Closet, and more.
- The **delivery of weekly bulletins, monthly newsletters and quarterly devotional books** to local care centers and Russell Regional Hospital keeps St. John members connected to their church family. Volunteers of all ages assist with making these deliveries. Personal visits are a vital part of the bulletin delivery ministry and visits with residents are welcomed and encouraged.
- The members of **425 Youth** participate in a wide variety of ministry projects: completing yard work, moving things from here to there (and back again), cleaning up the St. John Cemetery, collecting donations for local families, and more.
- Thanks to the generosity of the Richard and Ellen Mai family and the Earlin Nuss family, St. John Lutheran Church offers two **scholarships** each year. This year these scholarships were awarded to twelve students.

Gifts to Our Community and Beyond:

- As a member of the **Russell County Association of Churches**, St. John provides referrals to the Russell County Food Pantry and the Russell Community Thrift Shop, and collects RCAOC assistance applications and documentation.
- Striving to be good stewards of the earth, St. John **recycles** paper, plastic, aluminum, ink cartridges, and batteries
- Through its **Philanthropic Fund**, St. John Lutheran Church has supported the following local, regional, national and world-wide organizations: Post Rock Family Services, Lutheran School of Theology in Chicago, Camp Tomah Shinga, Navajo Evangelical Lutheran Mission, Lutheran Churches in Russia, December 2021 Wildfire Relief and more.

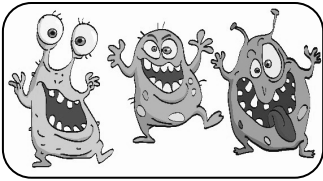

Spread kindness, not germs!

It's that time of year - kids are returning to school, seasonal illnesses are starting to make the rounds in our community, and icky germs seem to be everywhere. As Christians we are taught to share, but let's not share illnesses with one another. If you or a family member are not feeling well, stay home and take care. Don't share your cold, flu, pneumonia, strep throat, or other creepy germs with your church family! Please remember that what may be just an "annoying cold" for you could result in a serious health crisis for someone else.

I encourage us all to reduce our exposure to germs by not touching communal items and using elbow or fist bumps (even just waves) rather than shaking hands. Hand sanitizer will be available throughout the church for your use.

And WASH YOUR HANDS! Believe it or not... in the 1870s, Western Europeans discovered handwashing prevented the spread of disease and should be a keystone in practicing medical care. But "It wasn't until the **1980s** that **hand hygiene** was officially incorporated into American health care with the first national **hand hygiene** guidelines" in the United States.

I recently read this in one of the weekly quilters e-newsletters I receive: "The world seems to have (mostly) moved on from Covid, although it is still out there simmering away with new variants. How do I know? My best friend is studying the latest variants. Anyway, what do we call this period of time? Before Covid is 'BC'. So is After Covid 'AC'?... or maybe 'PP' for Post-Pandemic? So as we head into "AC" or "PP" or whatever the future may be called, let's be mindful of ways to protect ourselves and others from a variety of illnesses. ~ Blessings, Pastor Teri

- FOUND: Amalie Ehrlich's record of baptism and confirmation book. According to the information provided, Amalie was born March 25, 1898; baptized May 19, 1898; and confirmed March 16, 1916. The second book in the envelope, "Follow Me", is printed in German with a copyright date of 1910. A page is paperclipped inside this book. One side is a mimeographed copy of what appears to be a song with four verses and three statements/questions. On the other side is a handwritten note by Miss Mollie Ehrlich (in English): "This a song we sang when I got confirmate & we had to say the all together what's at the bottom of the song. Year 1913." If you know any of Amalie's family who would appreciate these mementos, please let the office know as soon as possible. If there is no response by the end of October, the booklet will be discarded.

St. John Ringers Bell Choir

Handheld bells have a long history, and credit for the development of the modern hand bell, or "handbell", is accorded to brothers Robert and William Cor in Aldbourne, Wiltshire, England, between 1696 and 1724. Handbells were first brought to the United States from England by Margaret Shurcliff in 1902. And, perhaps **most** importantly, the St. John Lutheran Bell Choir was established in 1976.

Juanita Flegler, St. John Ringers Director, and the whole crew are back in action - practicing 6:30 to 7:30 each Wednesday (through May). The Bell Choir presents music to the glory of God one Sunday a month at the 10:30 service (September through May), and during special services throughout the year.

St. John is blessed to have bells, chimes, gloves, sheet music, music stands and lights, table coverings, the bell ringers (ding-a-lings?), the accompanists, the director - all things that make the ministry of music ring loud and clear.

New members are always welcome (no special skills are required!!), and you are invited to stop by a practice and give it a try! If you are interested in joining the ringers, or would like more information, please contact the church office.

Agape Choir

Agape Choir will begin practices Wednesday, September 6 from 7:30 to 8:30 pm in the Sanctuary.

Agape Choir Director, Ruth Keil, has created a choir season to incorporate a variety of musical styles, with both familiar (and favorite) tunes, as well as contemporary choral arrangements. Ruth takes care when selecting music for the choir, making choices both the choir members and congregation will enjoy. She also strives to select music that complements the liturgical and seasonal calendars.

Agape Choir raises their voices to the Lord monthly at a 10:30 service (September through May), and at several special services throughout the year. The choir rehearses the three Wednesdays preceding a performance Sunday.

All are welcome to come and sing with us or come to see what Agape is all about. Come share in the spirit of the Lord through singing!

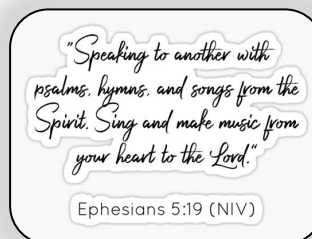

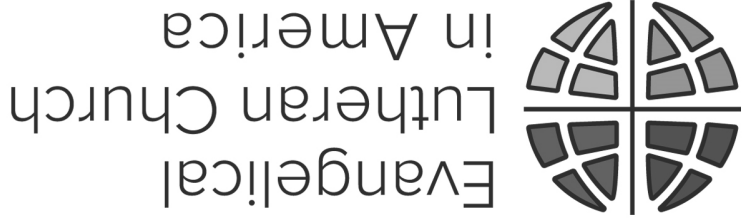
